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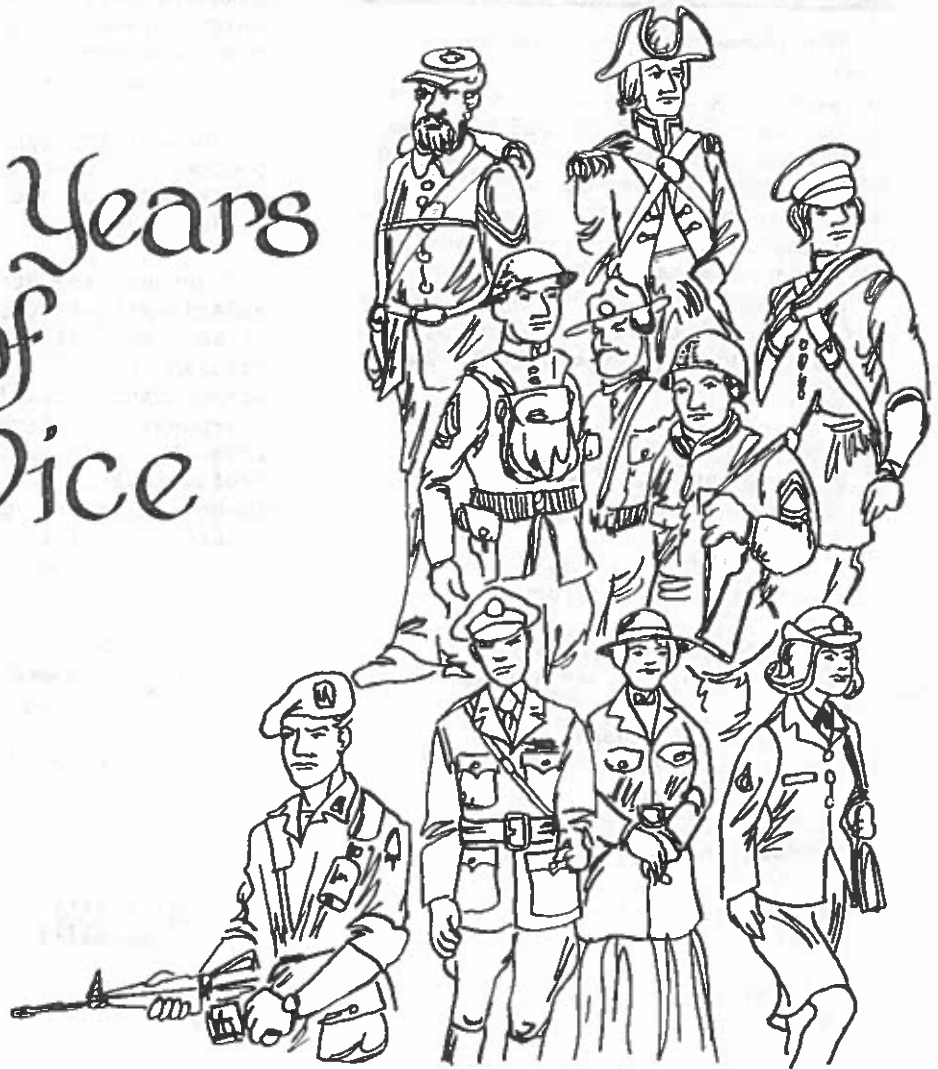

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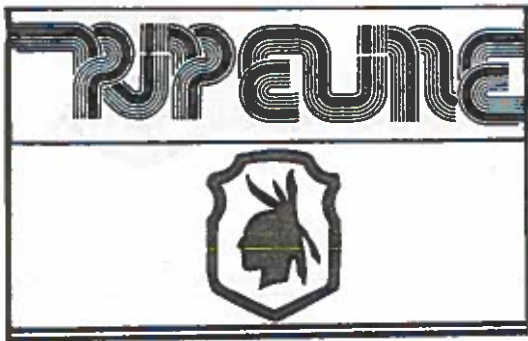
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## COMMANDER'S COMMENTS



# CAREER OPPORTUNITY

We know you already have a part-time job with the Army Reserve; but have you ever considered expanding it into a full-time career?

The 98th Division (Tng) currently has approximately 300 full time civilians assigned by Department of the Army to handle the day to day administration of the diverse number of units which comprise the Division.

In addition to the civilian responsibilities, each Division employee, with the exception of individuals holding certain clerical and maintenance position is required to participate as an active Reservist in the unit to which he or she is assigned. This policy enables the civilian employee to become familiar with the actual training problems encountered by the unit and on the other hand gives the unit the benefit of the employee's daily on the job experience.

The civilian jobs available range from Aircraft Worker Foreman to Supervisory Staff Administrative Assistant for the entire Division. Since the majority of these positions are under the jurisdiction of the US Civil Service, the salaries assigned follow the Government Service (GS) pay schedules. The jobs currently available in the Division range from GS-3 (minimum annual salary \$7100) to GS-13 (minimum annual salary \$23,000).

Opportunities for appointment to civilian job positions within the Division occur on a regular basis. At the time of this writing the Division has openings for Supply Clerks (GS-5) Recruiting Specialists (GS-7) and Heavy Mobile Equipment Repair persons (GS-8) among others.

Together with the satisfaction of performing a vitally important job in a challenging environment, the civilian employees of the Division share the identical pay and retirement benefits other Federal Government employees enjoy. These benefits compare favorably with those available to individuals serving in the US Reserve Program in terms of their comparison to benefit plans available in the private business sector.

The procedure to follow for those individuals interested in applying for civilian jobs within the 98th Division has deliberately been designed to be as painless as possible. The only form required to apply for a civilian position is Form SF 171 which may be obtained at any Post Office, Civil Service Office or USAR Center. This form is designed to obtain all pertinent information concerning the applicant's personal, educational and employment history in addition to his or her

Since there is no test required for these positions, the completed SF 171 is "graded" and the applicant rated and then, depending on the rating achieved by the applicant is placed on an eligibility list.

Since no test is required it is extremely

important that applications from interested individuals be completed as carefully and accurately as possible. Don't hesitate to attach additional pages to the original application if you feel that this extra information will more accurately reflect your aptitude for the job in which you are interested. Completed applications are then forwarded to: Director, US Civil Service Commission, New York Region, 56 Federal Plaza, New York, NY 10007

From talking with many of the civilians working for the Division it is obvious that they are interested in their work and proud of the contribution they are making to the successful completion of the many missions of the 98th Division. If you think you would be interested in learning more about the work they do and the benefits and rewards to be gained from a civilian career with the US Army Reserve, contact any civilian assigned to your local USAR Center. He or she will be glad to explain how your part-time Reserve job could be expanded into a full-time career.

## JUMPS - PHASE II

HQ, US Army Forces Command (FORSCOM), Ft McPherson, GA -- Reservists! Your pay will soon be completely centralized and automated thanks to JUMPS-RC, the Joint Uniform Military Pay System for Reserve Components.

JUMPS is the system used by the Active Com-

ponent since 1971. It has been modified to handle the special features of Reserve duty pay.

JUMPS-RC is being implemented in two phases. The first phase, completely operational by late 1975, incorporated all USAR units into the system for IDT/Drill Pay.

Phase II, now in the developmental stage, will convert annual training and active duty for training pay from the present system to JUMPS-RC.

The implementation of Phase I of the JUMPS-RC system was very successful with an error rate of less than one in 200. The system depends on you for checks on accuracy and on your local unit for accurate input.

Under JUMPS-RC you can have your paycheck sent anywhere you want -- your home, your bank, your credit union. JUMPS-RC distributes your check monthly instead of quarterly. Your check will arrive on or about the 5th of the second month after the month in which you attended drills.

## WHO'S MINDING THE STORE ?

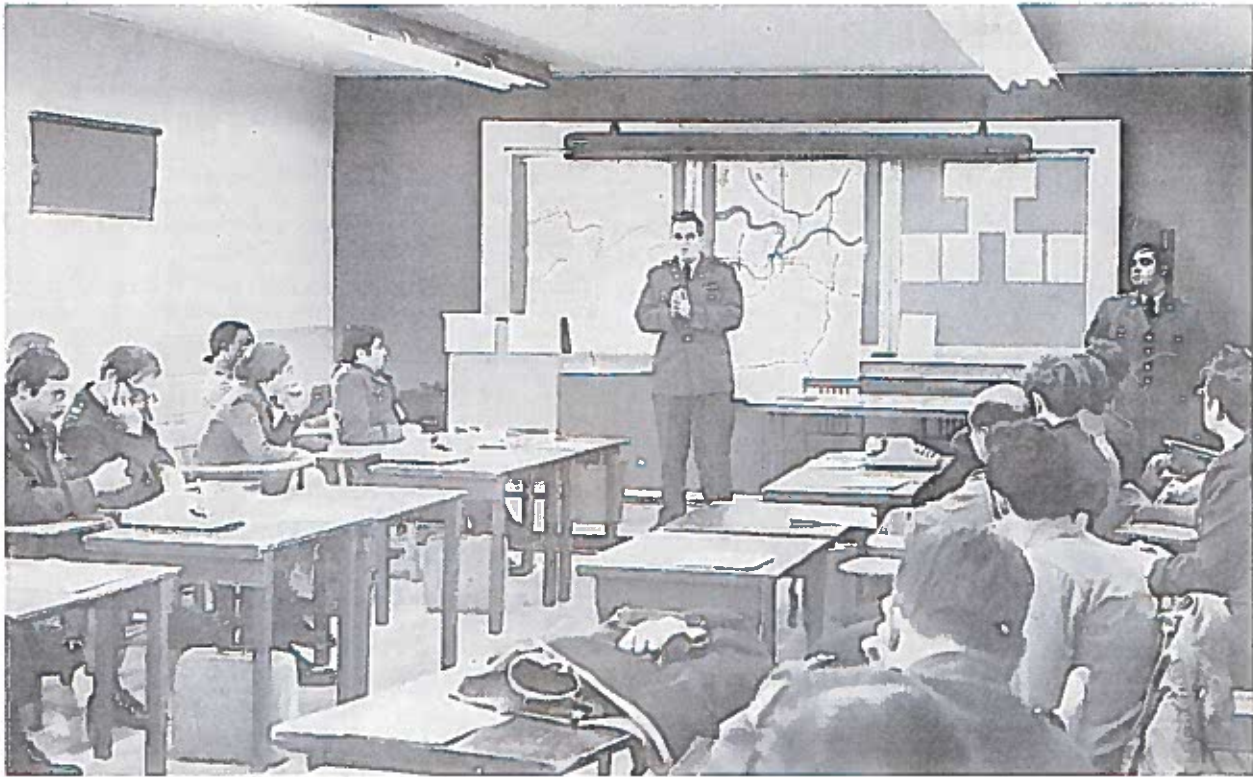
Well, this description of the volunteer soldier comes from a man who should know, Secretary of the Army Martin R. Hoffman. The Army Secretary described today's soldier in a statement to the Senate Armed Services Committee.

The soldier is 23 years old and has three years of active military duty. If a male, he's 5 feet, 10 inches tall and 167 pounds. If a female, she's 5 feet, 4 inches and 130 pounds.

Male or female, the soldier is likely to be a high school graduate. There's an even chance the soldier is married. Six times out of ten, he serves in a combat unit. He or she comes from a community of approximately 25,000 people and from a family with an annual income of about \$10,000.

Today's soldier is well motivated, highly skilled, interested in the military as a career and provides the Army leadership with a challenge to excel. He wants to be part of a team, he's inquisitive about the Army and he feels that the Army mission is important to the country and provides an individual challenge as well.

That should make you rest a little easier.



### 414th Civil Affairs Company at Work

Excellence was the rating earned by the 89 members of the 414th in both the field training exercise and the Command Post Exercise held at Ft Indiantown Gap, PA.

Of the 89 soldiers who went to the Gap for summer camp training, 23 stayed behind at the reserve center for recruiting. Of the 65 prospects who were interviewed, 30 to 35 people are expected to join.

Two service members of the 414th, Bob Peterson and Ed Gleske, graduated from NCO Academy during summer camp training held at Ft Indiantown Gap, PA in July.

The school is excellent according to the graduates. They agreed that learning to be an NCO brought out individual qualities that had been hidden. They also commented that the instructors were of the highest caliber, with a well-planned program and no loss of time. Many of the subjects covered were mainly about leadership.

"We learned a lot and met many nice people", Ed Gleske said. He also related "we left the school with a feeling that much was accomplished. It was a good experience and highly recommended by both of us".

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### A PAY INCREASE

Paychecks for reservists will be bigger soon, but exact amounts haven't been calculated.

A pay increase averaging 4.83 per cent for military and civil service federal employees has been signed into law, but President Ford hasn't issued specific allocation plans for the appropriation.

The raise was effective for military persons 1 October and will be reflected in paychecks shortly after that.

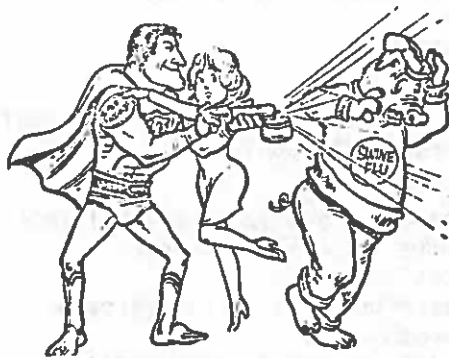
National Influenza Immunization Program.

The USPHS recommendations are as follows: "high risk" individuals, 18 years of age and over, will be encouraged to receive both the 'A' and 'B' type vaccines; non-high risk individuals, age 18 and over, will be encouraged to receive just the 'A' type New Jersey vaccine. Persons age 17 and under will not receive any vaccine until further recommendations are made by the USPHS, based on studies currently underway.

Availability dates for the vaccines are uncertain at present, except for 'B' type Hong Kong vaccine, which is now being procured. It is expected that the 'A' type vaccines will be distributed approximately 6-8 weeks after procurement action begins.

The word is out. The Army flu immunization program has started rolling. The program will consist of two parts: one for military personnel and the other for dependents, civilian employees and other eligible beneficiaries.

Army personnel will receive two shots: a vaccine against 'A' type New Jersey-A type Victoria and another vaccine against 'B' type Hong Kong disease.

Army Reserve and National Guard personnel will receive the 'A' types only. Dependents, civilian employees and other beneficiaries will receive vaccines as recommended by the US Public Health Service (USPHS) for the
