

Dr. Joseph B. Platt

Dr. Joseph B. Platt, Assistant Professor of Physics at the University of Rochester, joined the Radiation Laboratory of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in August of 1943. In January of 1944 he was sent to England with a group introducing a new radar device and was assigned to work with the staff of Major General Samuel Anderson who commanded the 9th Bomber Command. Returning to this country in October 1944, he worked on another radar device until July of 1945 when he was sent to Manila to head one of several teams of scientific consultants being set up for the Far East Air Forces.

Dr. Platt has chosen for his subject "Secret Weapons and Countermeasurers" and will tell about the history of the blind bombing mechanism with which he worked in Europe and the countermeasures program against the German V-1 as an example of what one does if he is on the receiving end of a war invention.

Hedke is Presidential-Nominee

The Nominating Committee of Rotary International has nominated Richard C. Hedke of the Rotary Club of Detroit for the office of President for the year 1946-47. Nomination by the committee has in the past always resulted in the election of the nominee. Dick is vice-president and managing director of the Easton-Clark Company of Detroit, Michigan, manufacturers and distributors of industrial chemicals and dye stuffs.

During his 25 years of membership in the Rotary Club of Detroit, Dick has served his club as director, vice-president, and president. He has served Rotary International as director, district governor, and as chairman and member of several committees. He recently served as Chairman of the "R. I. Headquarters" location Committee that recommended the removal of R. I. Headquarters to Denver. At the present time he is chairman of the Committee on Participation of Rotarians in the Postwar World.

Milt Trimby With Meacham

Announcement was made last week that Milt Trimby, who did his bit in the war as Field Director of the American Red Cross in Hawaii and the Philippines for 18 months, has joined the Meacham-Pontiac Corporation where he will be associated with Paul Meacham (of Pittsford Rotary). Milt's classification will not be affected since he held Veteran membership prior to his war service and will return to that status when his present classification of Mobilized Rotarian automatically becomes void on May 1.
