Dallas A. Wightman

Early in his career Dallas A. Wightman was a clerk and then a traveling salesman. In 1874 he became a partner with H. Montague Mosely in a factory and retail store of ladies' wear on E. Main Street in Rochester. In 1878 Mr. Wightman bought out the store which became "D. A. Wightman" and remained so until 1896. From 1897 to 1902 the store was called "Wightman & Co." In the Rochester City Directories, the owners of the store at that time were listed as Maria A. Wightman (Dallas' wife) and E. Fox. Dallas was still listed as the manager of the store up until his death on 21 Jan. 1903 at his home on Alexander Street. He was aged 57 years.
