### Orchids to the Lens Division

In August, 1942 the people of the Lens Division began sending cigarettes to their men in service. From then until September, 1944, approximately 800 cartons were sent.

September 14, 1944, the Reynolds Tobacco Company notified Frank Hilberer that they would be unable to send any more cigarettes. So, immediately the Lens Division decided that something else must be done for the men and women in service. On March 3, 1945, the Lens Division began sending bonds to the servicemen and women. The names were selected by a drawing. From then until December 18, 1945, \$1,175.00 in bonds was sent. The contributions were entirely voluntary on the part of the employees of the Lens Division. In the final drawing of bonds for the Lens Division servicemen and women, the following employees were winners:

Max Distler, S2/C Thomas O'Brien, Pvt. Joseph Distler, S2/C Leo Zenkel, Jr., Sgt. Charles Kritchen, Pvt.

In addition, for two years at Christmas, packages were sent to those in service, containing the following: 1 pipe, 1 lb. tobacco, 1 tobacco pouch, cigarettes or cigarette making machine and tobacco.
