SUGGESTION COMMITTEE MAKES TWO AWARDS FOR SUGGESTIONS

For his suggestion that a metal holder similar to a pencil clip, be placed on the lacquer brushes in the Lens Division, Bernard Ennis was awarded \$10 in cash.

This holder rests on the edge of the lacquer jar and suspends the brush in the lacquer, preventing the brush from becoming out of shape.

An award of \$10 was also given to Charles Kaiser of the Mechanical Division for his suggestion that a water pipe be run to the Carboloy Grinding Wheel, to eliminate the time spent in looking for a container to the wheel. This suggestion also insures the use of clean water at all times, thus avoiding any injury to the wheel caused by dirty water.

The Insurance Safety engineer heads his report on his recent inspection of our factory with the words: "Bottles (coke and milk bottles) should be removed from the machines, benches, etc., and put in receptacles provided for them."

On each floor there are cases for both the coke and milk bottles. After emptying the bottle of its contents, it should be returned to these cases.

We know that we leave these around, not through carelessness, but through thoughtlessness or forgetfulness. A serious accident may result from carelessly placed bottles.

Let's each one of us try to remember to put the bottle in its proper place. If we forget, maybe the worker next to us would be kind enough to put it in the case himself as he walks by.

A little cooperation on the part of each employee will help to eliminate this condition, which has been pointed out by the Safety Inspector to be a hazard.

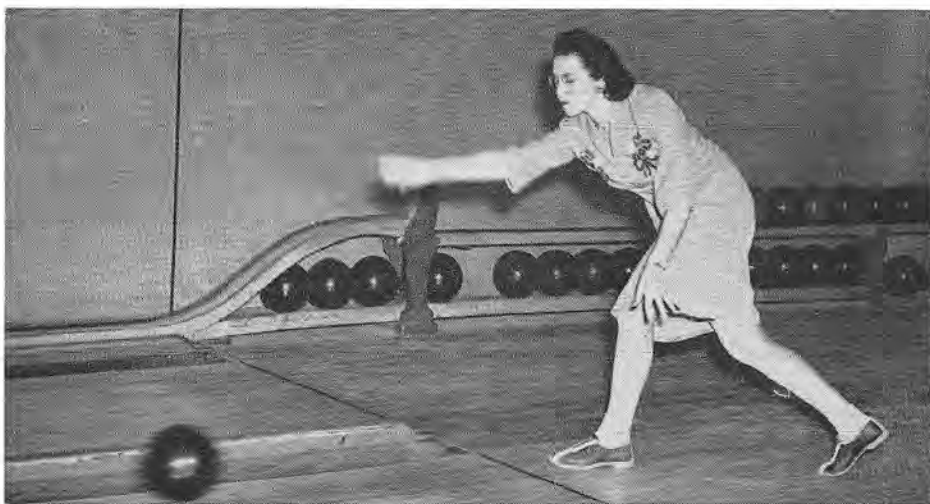
JAPP - KANE COMBINATION POSTS 1132 FOR FIRST MONEY IN MIXED DOUBLES . . .
