

Still another talent of Mr. Pruneau's is his directional ability. He shares with Dorothy Chernuck the task of directing the current season.

Many people will recognize her from her television appearances during the past year on many dramatic shows. Originally from Kansas, Miss Kerr has appeared with the Northwestern University Players, a repertory group in Chicago, the American Dance Repertory Company and numerous times with the Equity Library Theatre. She also toured with the Allenberry Players, in "The Animal," and worked as a volunteer actress at the Theatre Wing in New York. Her portrayal as Mabel in tonight's performance is in contrast to her wonderful performance as Miss Ronberry in last week's, "The Corn Is Green."

The Arena on Tour




