









A new coach, Carl Witzel, an experienced, well balanced starting five, and plenty of bench strength was considered by local sport analysts a winning formula for the Blue and White in Monroe County Class A competition. The Twelve Cornersmen got off to a fast start knocking Monroe and Brockport off in succession. Then, the roof fell in, and Witzelmen found themselves on the short end of their next four of six engagements.

Real champions are not only winners but also men or teams which can be knocked to the ground and again rise still fighting. In this way Witzel and his boys played the second half of county contention. 
