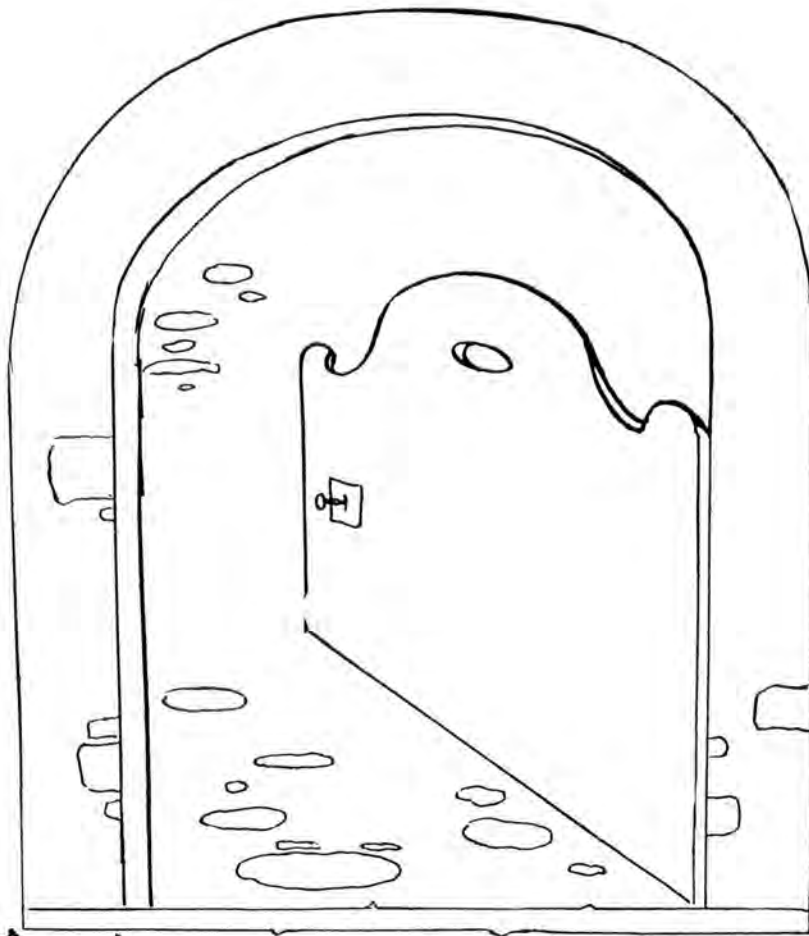

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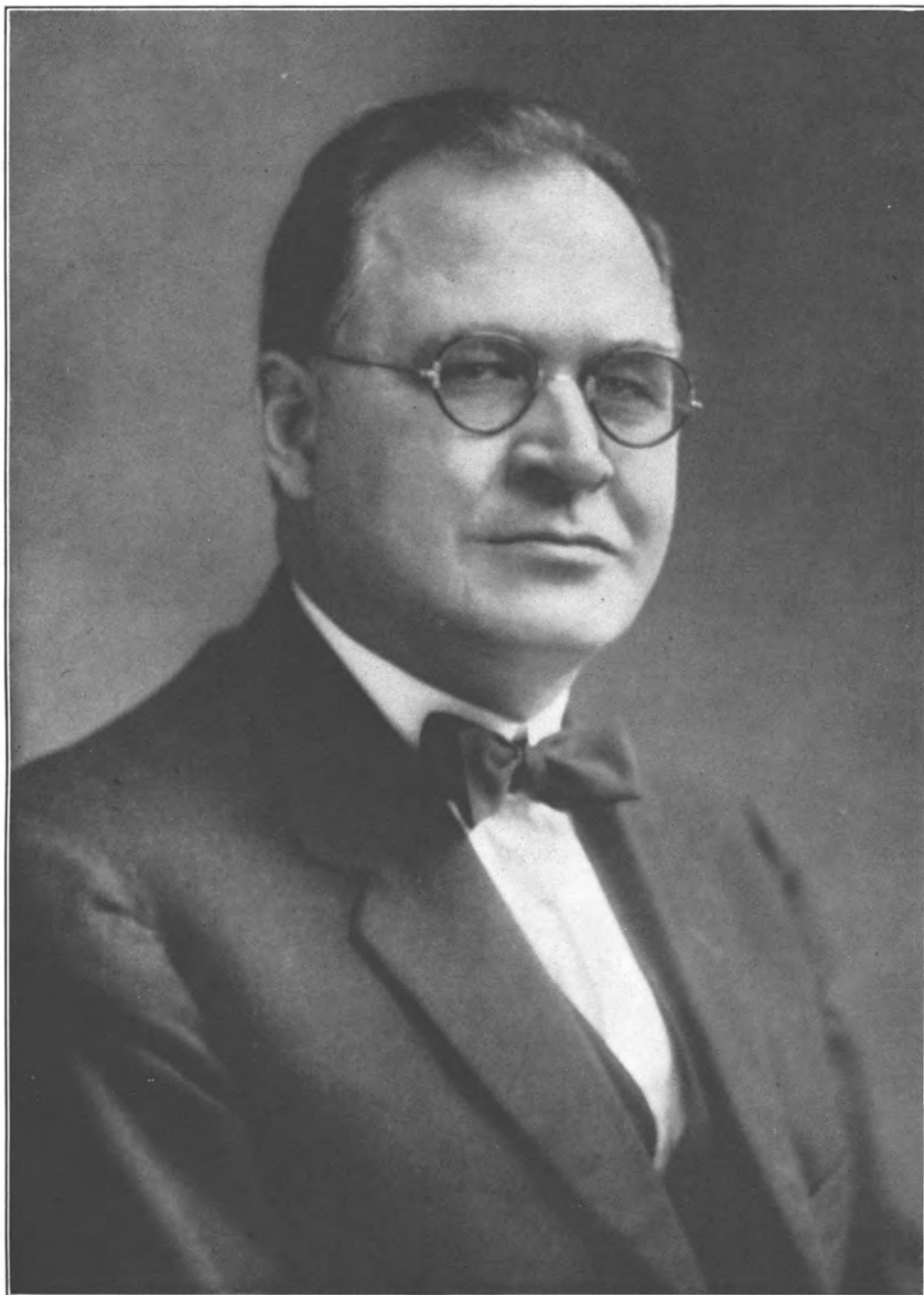

We believe honest work is the true secret of success and we go forward with bright hopes for the future.

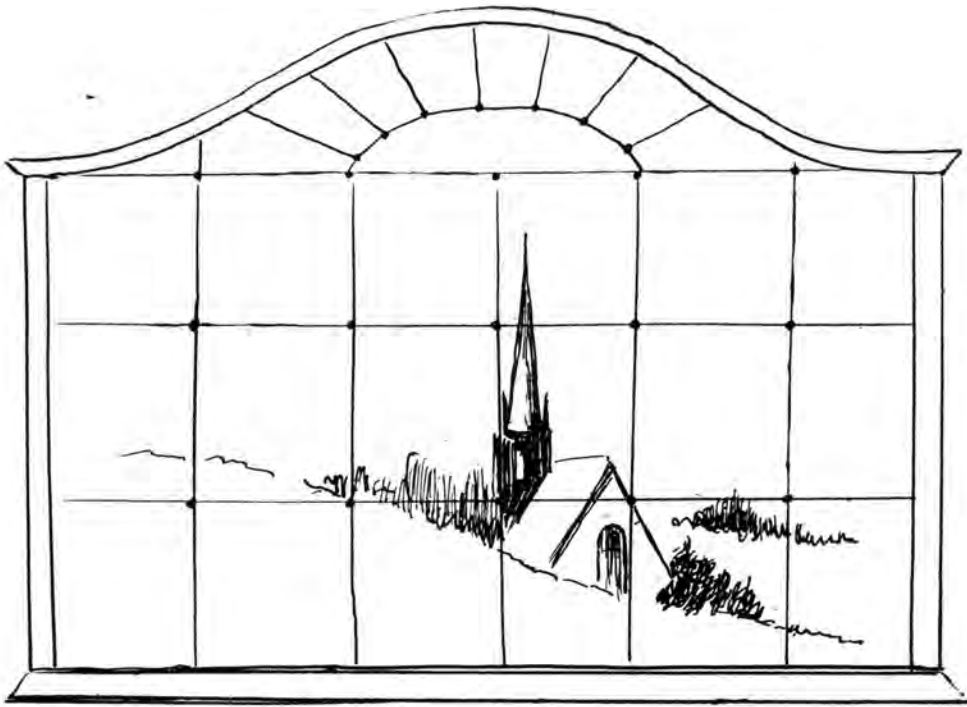

The Student Volunteer Movement

IT HAS been said that initiative is the foundation of all enterprise; without it the world would never have progressed to its present stage of civilization; without it the wake of Christianity would be limited to its earliest sphere; without it modern ideas and ideals would have been still in the making.

It is such a spirit that the Student Volunteer Movement instills in those who become aware of the need of the Volunteer's assistance. It is the Volunteer who is ready to respond when his God, his country, or his family need his help. It is he, who, amid persecution and discouragement, presses toward the goal of his calling and fulfills the purpose of his mission.

The Volunteers At Chesbrough haven't been so active this year as we might have been; yet we all have caught the vision which every true Volunteer sees and cherishes as the hope of his success.

The Volunteers met last Fall in the parlors at Roberts Hall and after some deliberations, signed the pledges and promised to defend the cause whose call they had felt and whose pleas demanded their assistance. There were twelve members in all, several of whom have left school since then. However, several others have become members of our organization and we all have retained the same enthusiastic spirit which is characteristic of all true Volunteers. We elected Ila Gunsolus as President and Melvin McNeese as Vice-President of the organization. Genevieve Wright was unanimously chosen Secretary and Treasurer.

The Volunteers were invited to attend the meetings of the Volunteer Union in Rochester, but were forced to decline due to unfavorable weather conditions. We appreciate the courtesy of our fellow Volunteers in others schools and intend to co-operate with them in the great mission which they go forth to perform.

We sent two representatives to the Retreat of the Student Volunteers at Auburn—Miss Wright and Miss Gunsolus. They attended meetings in Auburn from Friday night to Monday morning. Upon their return, they reported in Chapel what they had seen and heard. They stated that they had met the religious element from nearly all the large colleges in the state. They were introduced to several Japanese and Chinese students who seemed to enjoy the good old-fashioned religion. They met several prominent preachers in several different denominations who encouraged them to continue the work they had thus far so successfully advanced; to keep the spirit of progress in the spiritual, political, mental and physical world and to work toward the end which they had started to gain.

The Volunteers were present in a body at a memorial service held in the church for one of our Alumnae missionaries. Every one was encouraged to "keep on keeping on" when the life of our predecessors was so nobly portrayed before our eyes. The visits of foreign missionaries to our school make us realize the value of self-sacrifice to the individual.

The Volunteer Movement must not cease! It must move on until it has reached the goal of its ambitions and the spirit of initiative is carried to other hearts. It remains for us who have caught the vision to pass it on from generation to generation, to cherish in our own hearts the desire to help others and to do all in our power to spread the gospel so that every nation, race and tribe may receive the glad tidings of salvation and that it might be cherished in the light of civilization.

THE Ministerial Association of Chesbrough consists of about twenty-five young men and women who have heard the call, "Whom shall I send and who will go for us?" and who have answered, "Here am I, send me." As young people we consider ourselves highly honored in having this commission, "Go and tell this people." Of all the vocations of life we realize that that of the minister, of Christian worker, is the most lofty. We realize that to be able to meet this generation, we must have an adequate preparation. Only as we have such a foundation, as preparation in a Christian school gives, do we feel that we may be able, by God's help, to combat the forces of evil.

Great has been the work of the Free Methodist Church and we are determined to preserve those landmarks which have been maintained by our forefathers, and live and preach the doctrine of Christian perfection, thereby maintaining the spiritual integrity of our church.

Cunningham, our District Elder, Rev. Lincicome, the Evangelist, and Rev. Hendricks, of Buffalo, address us at different meetings. Rev. Simpson, our Pastor, has been with us in our regular meetings. He has given us much encouragement and advice. We greatly appreciate this man of God.

Meetings are held Sunday afternoon at three o'clock in Cox Hall. At these meetings different members of the Association preach. These meetings have been a means of grace to the entire student body as well as to those of the community who attend.

MISSIONARY SPIRIT

THE purpose of the Mary E. Carpenter Missionary Society has remained for thirty-nine years unchanged. The need has varied at times, and accordingly, the work, yet the object continues always the same—that of securing contributions for missions, obtaining and spreading missionary information and encouraging missionary effort among our students.

We are learning as members of this society that there are several lines of true missionary effort. Our programs of the past year, which the committees have endeavored to make both interesting and instructive have depicted to us stirring conditions at home as well as abroad. Mrs. Garlock in her address to the Missionary Society on the evening of December 1, spoke on the subject of immigration.

Immigration is indeed a vital subject of today and one with which every truly consecrated Christian should be familiar. For is not the spirit of the Master always the Missionary spirit, ever demanding zealous devotion and consecrated service? And can one be capable of this zeal with the needy condition of the foreigner, who stands at our very threshold and cries out with the voice of ignorance, poverty and disease for aid? "How shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach except they be sent?" *Rom. 10:14-15*.

Miss Emily Clark, a former teacher at Chesbrough, now a Missionary on furlough from the Sudan, gave great inspiration to the Missionary movement at Chili in her talk on February 23. She spoke of her work there among the darkened heathen, where she has been able to establish a lighthouse in the form of a school for girls.

Other programs have been rendered by the students in which personal research work into missionary fields has been accomplished.

The officers for the first semester were: President, Ellen Parker; Vice-President, Ila Gunsolus; Corresponding Secretary, Anna Williams; Secretary, Benjamin Franklin; Treasurer, Havreth Owlett. At the second election of officers, for the second semester, the following students were elected: President, Genevieve Wright; Vice-President, Alberta Wilson; Corresponding Secretary, Anna Rose; Secretary, Grace McChesney; Treasurer, Havreth Owlett.

The membership campaign during the second semester was graciously rewarded and enthusiasm has remarkably increased.

The death of Mrs. Kitty Wood Kumarakulasinghe, who attended Chesbrough at one time, was deeply felt among the students. Her devoted life and self-sacrificing work in Ceylon was brought before us in an interesting way by her brother, Mr. B. Ives Wood, in the memorial service held here in her honor.

One event of special encouragement and satisfaction to us this year was the Student Volunteer Educational Retreat held at Auburn, New York. March 19-21, to which our student body sent delegates. Ila Gunsolus and Genevieve Wright represented us as Student Volunteer members. It was a source of great pleasure to us to learn that Chesbrough Junior College has more students who have received definite, personal calls to missionary work than any other College in New York State. This clearly demonstrates that our purpose is finding its fulfillment in the hearts of those who are being enlightened to the circumstances.

However, we must pray more. The circumstances in which we find our world constitute the greatest call to prayer that this world has ever known. One billion people, two-thirds of the human race—nearly two thousand years after Jesus sent forth his apostles—are still without any knowledge of the Saviour. For this the surest remedy is prayer. It has been said that if God's people—those who profess to love Him—would give half the time to earnest, believing prayer that they now spend in activities, a wave of spiritual energy would sweep the earth that would tremendously hasten the coming of the Heavenly Kingdom.

Jesus' prescription is the remedy for present perplexities. "The Harvest is great, the laborers are few," He said; "therefore pray."

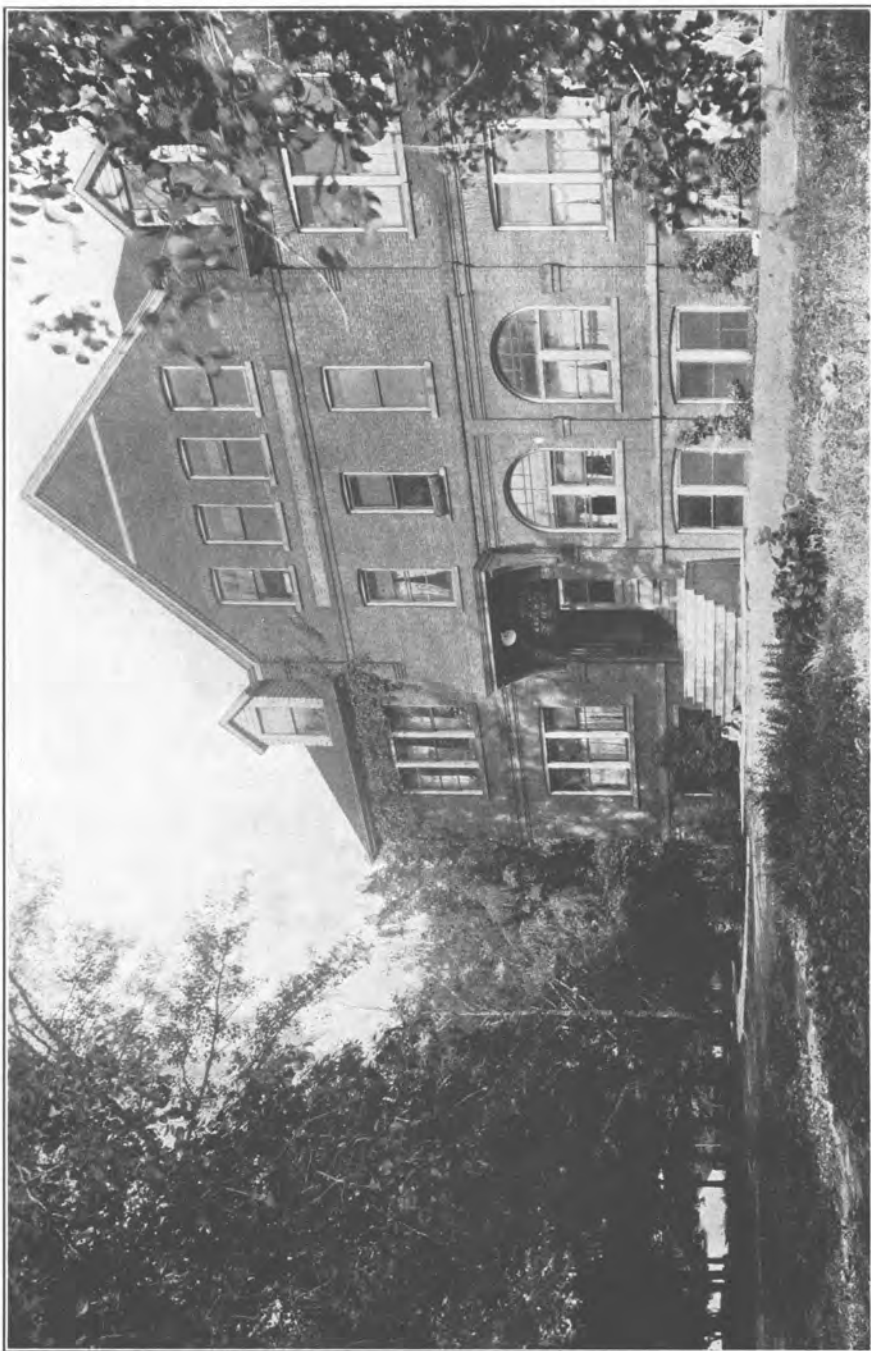
The fourth quarter is now before us, and the best remains in store. From April 30 until the close of the year the following programs will be rendered by the different classes and associations:

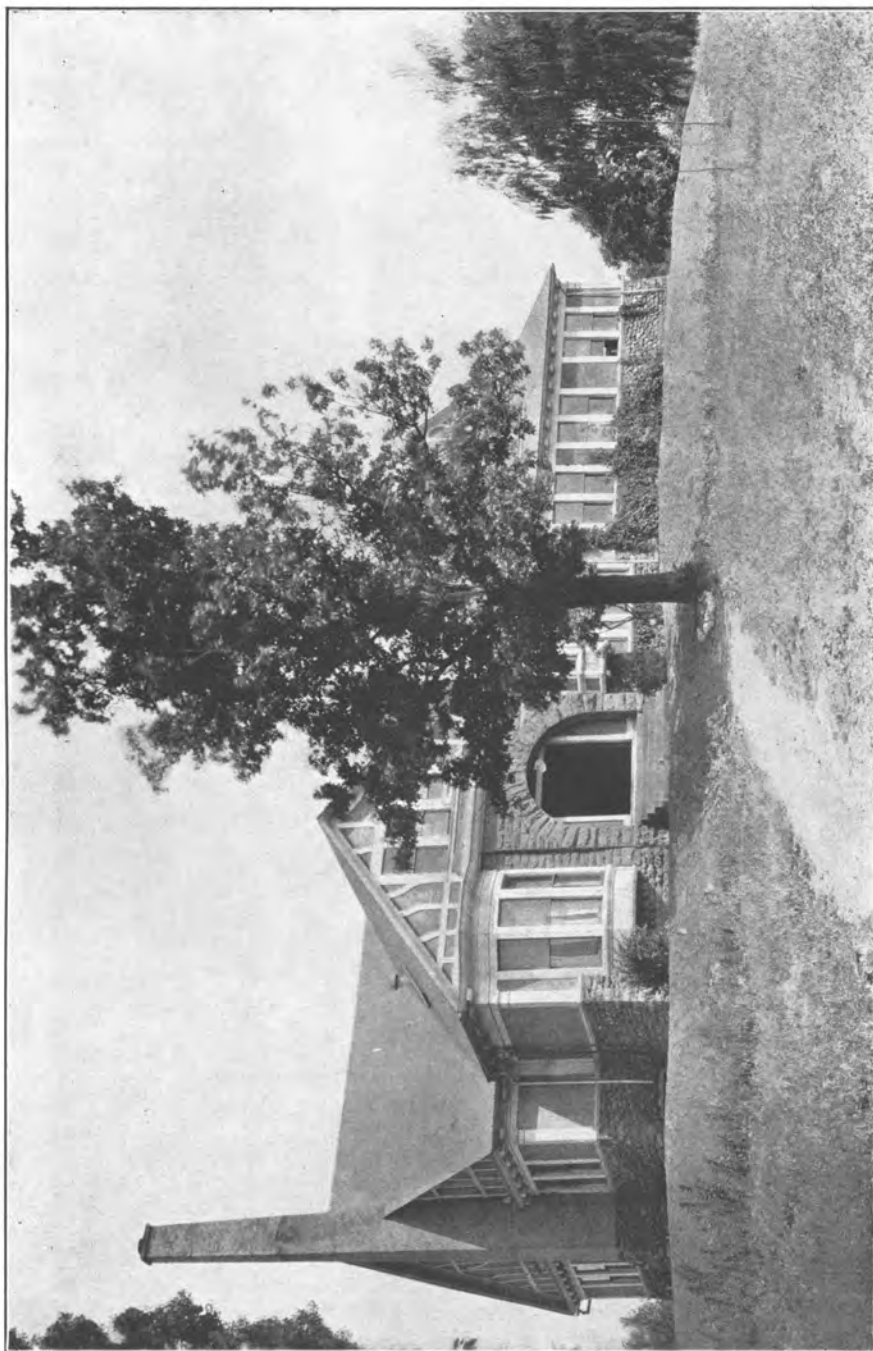

Basketball Team - *Reds*

MUCH enthusiasm was aroused last winter at Chesbrough in the basketball games. Basketball is our chief winter sport and nearly all the students took part in it in some way. The Faculty thought it advisable to divide the student body into two opposing sides and have a tournament within the school instead of having games with outside players. The two sides known from now on as the Reds and Blacks, each had three teams. There were the first and second teams of the boys and one team of the girls. We played a series of fifteen games in all, each team playing five games. Most of the games were played on Saturday nights. The three teams of each side played well, as the students and as the town folk who attended will testify. Every game was fought hard and close. The boys' first teams were quite evenly matched and no one was able to tell which side would come out ahead for the scores usually differed by only one or two points. The boys' second teams showed much skill and surprised many with the results. The girls' teams were better this year than at any other known time and their games drew much interest for their spectacular and good playing.

The tournament was won by the Red side. Out of the fifteen games the Reds won ten. The boys' first team of the Reds won all five, but it's a mystery yet, how it all happened. The boys' second team of the Reds won two games and the Red girls won three out of five. In figuring up the total number of points the Reds had 258 and the Blacks had 253, thus showing that the Reds were not so superior to their opponents after all.

Before the tournament started, a silver loving cup was presented to the school by Mr. Raymond Strickland and Alton Dailey for the winners of the tournament. The side that won the tournament was to receive the cup and have its name engraved on it.

The Reds and Blacks are still holding that rival spirit which is being shown to a great extent in their games.

There are some students who are more interested in tennis; and for these people we have a tennis court which is rarely unoccupied in good weather. Last Spring and Fall there were so many tennis champions (?) that we didn't have room to accommodate them all at their appointed times, so plans have been made for the building of two regulation size courts. When these courts are finished, Chesbrough will be fairly well equipped for active sports.

TRIED AT COX HALL, MARCH 12, 1926

All North Chili and vicinity were stirred Friday morning, March 12, '26 by the above headlines of the Chili Morning Press. Friday evening, Cox Hall was crowded to the doors to catch a glimpse of the criminal and to hear the ensuing trial.

Judge Janowski called the court to order and the clerk, Anthony Suchoski, called the case of A. M. Chesbro Seminary against Richard Wing. The witnesses were ready and the prisoner was brought in by the Deputies, Jack Moore, Graydon Warbois and Sheriff Daly.

After putting people through a rapid fire of questions, a satisfactory jury was finally chosen. We learned many interesting things about our fellow Citizens. Mr. Wickline considers himself very intelligent. Fletcher Simpson is not sympathetic. And Ethel Warbois has natural curly hair.

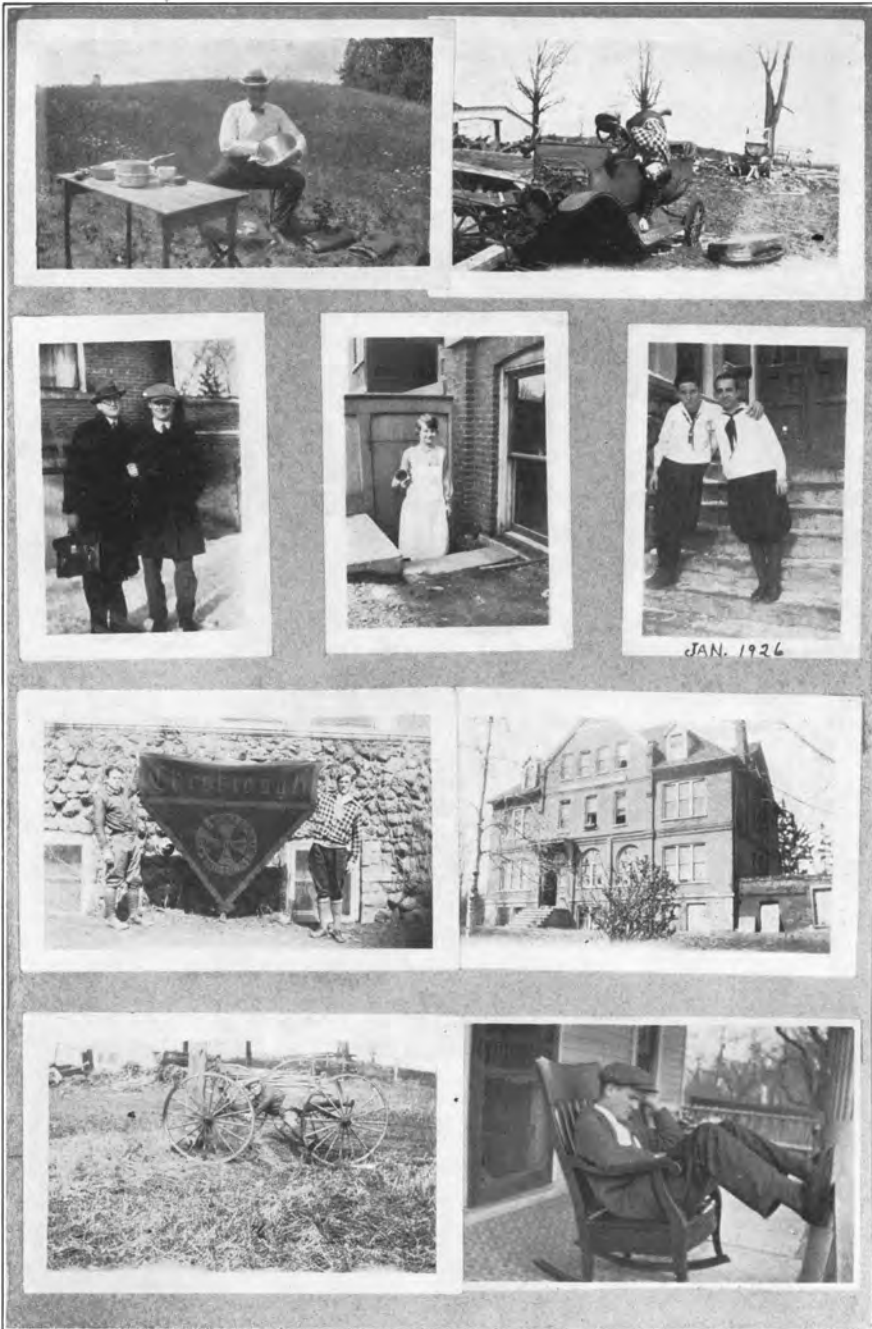
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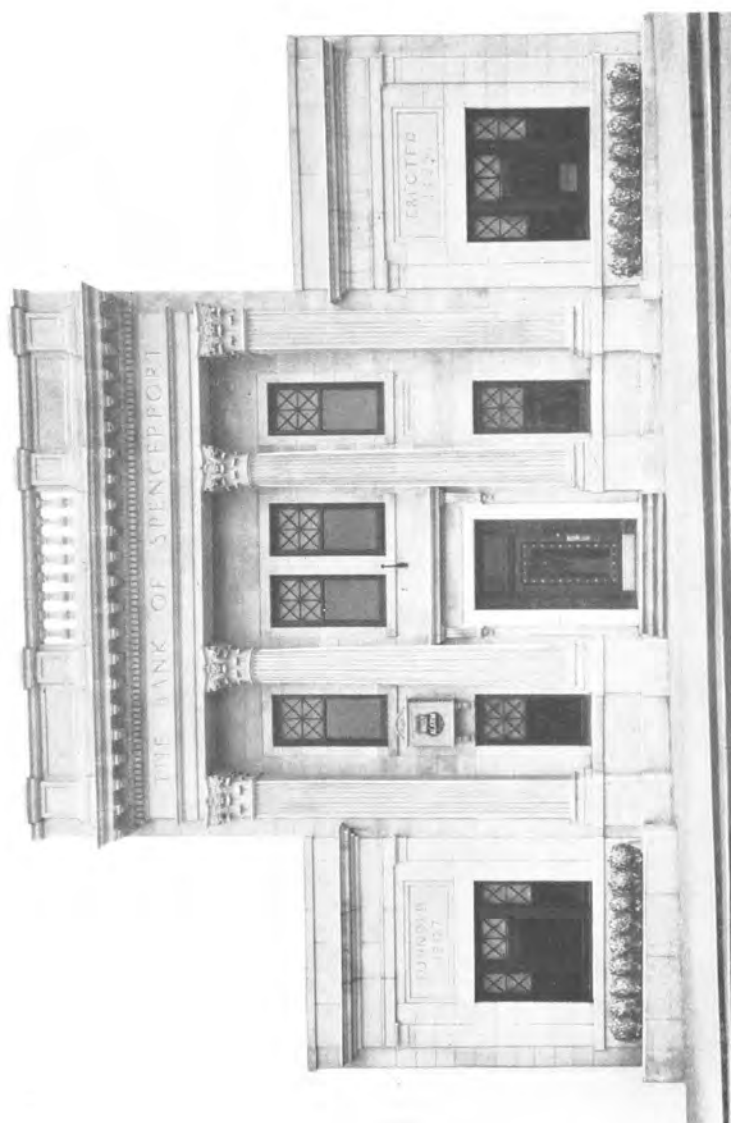
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
