


Sports dominates Mr. Wallace's life. When he is not coaching he is viewing his favorites, baseball and football, on T.V.


Mr. Wallace also enjoys the mountains and maintains a cottage on Eagle Bay where he can enjoy life with his family.

#### SIX STUDENTS INDUCTED INTO NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY IN 1966






#### HARVEST QUEEN




### VARSITY WRESTLING TEAM





### CHEERLEADERS








# BOYS' INTRAMURALS PROMOTE GOOD SPORTSMANSHIP
