Message from the Managing Director

Your Theatre's 30th Anniversary Season

Celebrating our 30th anniversary this year has given us pause to contemplate our legacy both in Rochester and the country as a whole. If you just look at it in the context of years, Geva Theatre Center is not really all that old. The RPO, for example, has been around for more than 80 years and the Rochester Museum and Science Center for more than 90. On a national level there are many theatres our size that are much older. But to us, 30 years is more than just another birthday.

Thirty years ago Geva was the dream of just a few people. That dream has grown into a 5.5 million dollar institution that annually serves over 150,000 patrons, including 16,000 students. Earlier this year we changed our name to Geva Theatre Center to better describe the scope and breadth of work that we are doing in every area of production, education and outreach. We feel like our building has become a community place where people of all ages and heritages can hear a "voice" that they recognize. Geva has become your theatre.

On the national level, your theatre has begun to gain prominence. Through our New Plays Programs (American Voices and Hibernatus Interuptus) and our World Premieres on both the Mainstage and Nextstage, we have built the reputation of being one of the nation's leaders in new play development. As these new plays are redone at other prominent theatres, the good word about Geva spreads.

In the world of education our star has risen perhaps the quickest of all. After only three short years, Big Theatre for Little People has gained a national reputation as one of the best theatre programs for elementary school age children. This may be the thing that we are most proud of: Not the fact that it is bringing us such acclaim, but the fact that we are able to bring high quality theatre to students.

This place, that so many patrons, artists and staff call home, continues to dream. Together, we all dream of the day that we will be regarded as the best theatre in the country. When that day happens we will all make history.

Funding for sign language interpreted events is provided, in part, by a grant from Theatre Development Fund's TAP Plus program in cooperation with the New York Council on the Arts.


