

### NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR

# Broadway Dound

Broadway Bound is the final chapter in the memoirs of Eugene Morris Jerome of Brighton Beach, New York. We watched him as an adolescent during the late 1930s of Brighton Beach Memoirs, and witnessed his loss of innocence during the World War II of Biloxi Blues. In this final play (placed in 1949), he evolves as a writer of real comedy and we are left to imagine Eugene becoming as successful as his real-life counterpart and creator, Neil Simon.

As director of all three *BB* plays here at Geva this has been a unique experience. It's rare that a director returns to the same characters, in different circumstances, over a period of three seasons. The most direct equivalent could be the trilogies of Greek Tragedy though in Simon's case the touch is lighter and more hopeful.

Simon didn't start out writing a trilogy. After the first installment he

Since the first two plays [of the trilogy, Brighton Beach Memoirs and Biloxi Blues] were extremely successful, the burden of making Broadway Bound equally successful lay heavily on my shoulders. Like any other chain, if one of the links were weak, the strength of the trilogy would be broken. Since I had a very clear picture in my mind of who the characters were and how they behaved, I became more confident and secure each day I worked on it. It all started with one image in my mind: my mother waxing her dining room table. . ."
