



The Artistic Company

RAYMOND BOKHOUR (*Kemp*) makes his Geva debut in *Vigil*. Mr. Bokhour is an actor,



composer and writer. Most recently he was seen on Broadway in the musical *Chicago* as Mr. Cellophane, a role for which he received a Helen Hayes Award nomination. Other theatre includes

The Big Time (NYMF '05); Rameau's Nephew (Portland Stage); King Lear and Road to Nirvana (ART); and Two Gentlemen of Verona, Much Ado About Nothing, Romeo and Juliet and Don Juan (Actors Shakespeare). He appears in the films Man on the Moon, Hitman's Journal, Ali, Changing Lanes and I'm With Lucy. Television work includes "Ed," "The Job," "Third Watch" and "Law & Order." Mr. Bokhour's compositions have been recorded by the London Symphony and Warsaw Philharmonic Orchestras and performed at Carnegie Recital Hall. His play Fly South was performed at the '91 Edinburgh Fringe Festival in Scotland, and won the Sommerville Arts Council Award for Best New Work. His play American Mouth was part of the NY Fringe Festival in 2003. He is a proud member of the SGI.

IRMA ST. PAULE (*Grace*) This is Ms. St. Paule's first time performing at Geva



Theatre Center. She has trod the boards through theatre history, from Greek classics to restoration comedies and from Shakespeare to modern classics. Ms. St. Paule has appeared

on Broadway in Rose Tattoo with Mercedes Ruehl. Off Broadway she has been in Beckett's Endgame, Valle Inclain's Words Devine, The Legend of Sharon S., Don Juan Returns From the War and Another Part of the House (by Migdalia Cruz). She has worked at several regional theatres including the Goodman Theatre, Pittsburgh Public Theatre, Tennessee Repertory and Cleveland Playhouse. Ms. St. Paule has had the honor of working with directors Robert Falls, David Esbjornson, Mark Wing-Davey, Rezah Abdoh and now with Geva's Artistic Director, Mark Cuddy.

MORRIS PANYCH (Playwright) A native of Edmonton, Alberta, Morris Panych is arguably Canada's most celebrated playwright and director. His plays have garnered countless awards including two Governor General's Literary Awards for Drama (for The Ends of the Earth and most recently, Girl in the Goldfish Bowl), Canada's most prestigious literary honor, 14 Jessie Richardson Awards, three Sidney Riske Writing Awards and five Dora Mayor Moore Awards. Productions of the much lauded Vigil (Auntie & Me), Girl in the Goldfish Bowl, Seven Stories and Lawrence and Holloman are currently being mounted throughout Canada, the US, Europe, Asia, Australia and New Zealand. His groundbreaking work The Overcoat is currently touring worldwide to great acclaim and its film version, which Mr. Panych also directed, won an honorable mention at the Prix Italia.

His plays have been produced in over a dozen languages; he has written 25 works for the stage. Mr. Panych has directed over 60 productions across Canada including Take Me Out, Vigil, Amadeus, Sweeny Todd, Hysteria (CanStage), Nothing Sacred, You Never can Tell (Shaw Festival) and Girl in the Goldfish Bowl (Tarragon Theatre).

Acting credits include guest starring roles on "Just Cause," Davinci's Inquest," "Beggars and Choosers," "Cold Squad" and a recurring role on the hit series "X-Files," as well as over 50 stage produc-




