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

ALBERT R. STONE

The photographs on these pages and in the lobby were taken by Rochester Herald photographer Albert R. Stone. Geva Theatre Center



wishes to thank the Stone family, especially Helen Stone Reinhard, and the Rochester Museum & Science Center for their generosity in sharing these images with us.

In 1904, Albert R. Stone became the first staff newspaper photographer in Rochester; his son Daniel joined him on the staff of

the Herald in 1928. The Rochester Museum & Science Center's Stone collection houses 13,000 of their images, which record the people, events, tragedies and celebrations in Rochester between 1904 and 1934.

Their photographs give us insight into both the local response to momentous events, such as the First World War, and the vibrant life of the city during a period of great change.

Holding meaning for us today far beyond the newspaper stories they accompanied, they are compelling visual records of the first quarter of the 20th Century.

appearance in his fourth A Christmas Carol (Christmas Present). Guy has previously appeared in Geva's Irish plays The Weir (Jack) and That Was Then (Noel, North American premiere). He also took

part in the Hibernatus Interruptus Festival of New Plays (2003). Last winter, Guy was seen as Chaplain de Stogumber in St. Joan at Theatre Calgary, Alberta, Canada, During 2006, Guy completed his 19th season at the Shaw Festival in Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ontario, playing Ezekiel Cheever in The Crucible and Henry in the world premiere adaptation of The Invisible Man, by Michael O'Brien. Guy has appeared coast to coast in Canada, as well as in the U.S. and England, since spending five seasons at the Stratford Festival (Ontario) as a young actor. Recent television work includes the role of Lt. Murphy on the CBC/YTV series "Daring and Grace Teen Detectives," Mr Bannerman can still be heard as the voice of Mr. Bear on "Rupert Bear." Guy returns to the Shaw Festival this year to play another doctor, Dr. Buchanan in Summer and Smoke; his Geva Irish experiences will stand him in good stead for his role as Bartley Fallon in Lady Gregory's Irish comedy, Spreading the News. Guy received a Tyrone Guthrie Award at Stratford in 1969, and a Newton Award at the Shaw Festival in 2003.

PEGGY COSGRAVE (Artistic Lady in a Box / Mrs. Soames), a professional actor for 35 years, is pleased to be returning to Geva Theatre Center after her recent role as Mae in the U.S. premiere of That Was Then. Peggy has recently appeared at the Pioneer Theatre as Penny in You Can't Take It With You. Other recent credits include Hattie in The Women of Lockerbie, May
