CODAK PLAYS A MORE IMPORTANT ROLE IN TODAY'S constant space-age experiments than the layman who scans the skies to get a peek at a zooming rocket realizes.

Take, for instance, the upcoming attempt by the Navy to send a balloon up 15 miles into the stratosphere for the purpose of photographing the infrared spectrum of Mars. At this point, the chief item of interest Company-wise is that high-speed photographic plates made by Kodak will be used.

But actually the Kodak tie-in involves much more. There was advance planning, supplying plates for trials and experiments, and the making of a plate never before available specifically for this purpose. Then there had to be instructions on how the plates should be hypersensitized and explicit processing recommendations.

As early as last March came a request from Dr. John Strong, a professor in the laboratory of astrophysics and physical meteorology at Johns Hopkins University, explaining that it was planned to observe Mars at the end of this calendar year by means of a balloon telescope at 80,000 feet altitude.

They were planning to use infrared I-M Kodak "Spectroscopic" Plates . . . could Kodak suggest anything better, Prof. Strong wanted to know. "Or is there anything that can or will be coming out by next fall which shows promise?" Strong wrote Bill Swann, manager of Kodak's Special Sensitized Products Sales Div.

Swann promptly contacted the Kodak Research Laboratories and was assured that every effort would be made to make an M plate more sensitive than our regular I-M for a long exposure time

for a long exposure time.

By mid-May experimental plates were sent to Strong and to Dr. C. C. Kiess of the Bureau of Standards and Dr. W. M. Sinton of Lowell Observatory who are collaborating with Johns Hopkins on this Navy-sponsored photographic problem.

# Balloonists Set To 'Capture' Mars On Kodak Plates

at the KP Research Laboratories will be keenly interested in the results of this month's Navy probe above the murk and haze of the Earth's atmosphere.

A giant plastic balloon will lift a gondolamounted 16-inch telescope, designed by Prof. Strong, on its 24-hour ascent. It is hoped that Strong and Navy Comdr. Malcolm Ross will have a minimum of two hours for "shooting Mars."

Their main task will be to make sure that

Their main task will be to make sure that the instrument is pointing accurately at Mars. Most of the aiming will be done by automatic electronic equipment. It is necessary, however, to have a human supervisor standing by to check focus, to change the 3½x4½ plates and to make sure that everything is working satisfactorily.


