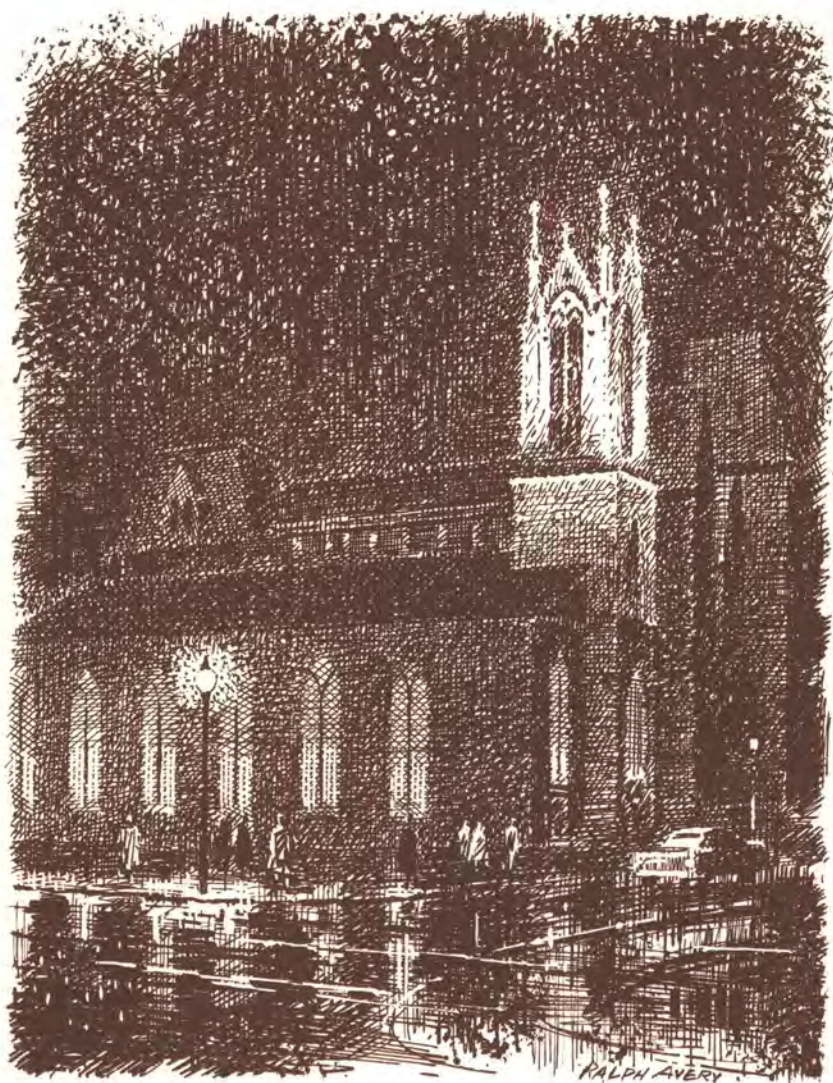

## The Restoration of the Church in 1966

Since 1856 the exterior of St. Luke's has continued essentially as you see it today.

Fortunately, pictures were taken of the chancel in 1865, the date being established because one of them shows the church draped in black for the memorial service for President Lincoln.

Since 1856 there have been three major revisions of the interior; the latest, in 1966, endeavored to restore the church to its earlier appearance. The present changes include: reconstruction of the chancel walls and installation of molded plaster tracery in Gothic style according to the picture of 1865; redecoration of the chancel and the nave; transferral of the choir and the 1825 memorial organ to the gallery, where they were placed originally.

As in many early buildings, the woodwork in St. Luke's was painted and grained pine. Careful study showed that the painting was of light hue, and the restored colors have greatly brightened the interior. The cluster columns were marbled, and the capitals as well as the corbels and groins of the arches over the gallery were gilded, the gallery front was grained, and the walls painted to resemble stone.

The present Skinner organ is considerably larger than the original gallery installation. It was necessary, therefore, to make room for it in the tower area. More than forty tons of stone and wood that formed parts of the church when it was built in 1824—ten years before the old Rochesterville became the City of Rochester—were chipped and pried away. The roof is supported by huge oak beams and much of the woodwork, anchored by wooden pegs, still bears the mark of the adzes wielded by craftsmen almost a century and a half ago.

The altar was enlarged and refurbished so that it may be used against the reading desk in conventional fashion or free-standing. The sedilia or clergy seats are new. The niches where formerly stoves stood have been made into credenzas to receive the Communion vessels.
