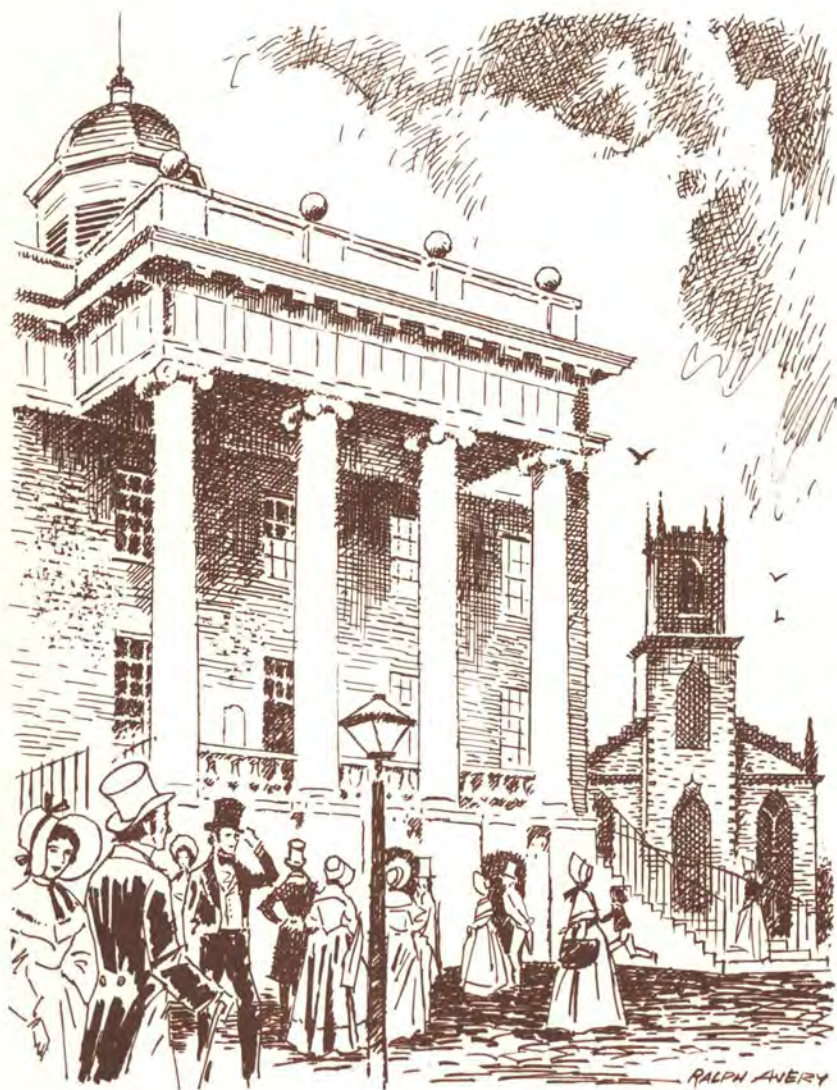

This stone, bearing the mark of Ernulf, Bishop of Rochester 1115-1124, builder and restorer, was presented to St. Luke's, Rochester, N. Y. by the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Christ and the Blessed Virgin Mary, Rochester, England, as a link binding the old and the new.

The stone was brought to St. Luke's by the Right Rev. Charles Henry Brent, Bishop of Western New York, and dedicated by him on April 24, 1927.

The historic city of Rochester in Kent, England, was probably the first formidable military obstacle that faced the invading Romans as they advanced inland from the shores of Kent. The Romans built a large camp there, whose surrounding walls can still be seen.

Saxons under their chieftain Hrof settled here (the name Rochester reminds us that the place was once called "Hrof-Caestre"—Hrof's castle). King Ethelbert of Kent walled the settlement and following his conversion to Christianity by St. Augustine, who landed in England in A. D. 597, he founded the missionary church which was the forerunner of Rochester's present Cathedral. In the floor of the nave is a brass strip marking the site of the original Saxon church. The Cathedral dates from the 12th to the 14th centuries and was consecrated in the presence of King Henry I (1100-1135).

This stone, which has seen many changes in its 900-year old history, is a constant reminder of our ties with the Church of England.
