Director's Notes

Earlier this month, I heard Chechnian rebels talk about "necessary casualties of war in a fight for independence" as they justified their action of kidnapping innocent hostages.

Oleanna focuses on sexual harassment as its object, but the play could be about any number of causes and the extremist fringe that support such causes. To such fanatics there is nothing more important than their particular cause. As such, they feel empowered to deviate from the rules of behavior that we normal people generally adhere to. People who get hurt in the process of serving the cause are merely "necessary casualties."

Over 125 years ago, the great Norwegian violinist, Ole Bull, was touring in America, and was seized with the grand idea to start a Norwegian colony in Pennsylvania. But some sharpers sold him a lot of poor land - rocks and trees - and the first colonists nearly starved to death before the project was abandoned. It would all be forgotten now, but that someone in Norway wrote what would become a tremendously popular song (Oleanna) on both sides of the Atlantic, satirizing the unrealistic dreams of Norwegians who had "America fever." Tonight you'll hear four versions of this folk song. I hope you'll understand and appreciate the satire.
