PHYSICIANS or other patrons expecting telephone calls or important messages should leave their names and locations of their seats at the box office before entering the auditorium.

#### "The Crisis"

For his second week production and in commemoration of Independence Day, Mr. Glaser has selected the thrilling, semi-military romance, "The Crisis," a dramatization of Winston Churchill's famous novel of the same name. As Mr. Churchill dramatized the book himself the clever story has lost none of its interest through the dramatization and the play has proven as highly successful as the novel itself. The play is laid in St. Louis just previous and during the civil war, the settings being given just enough of the beautiful southern atmosphere of romance and chivalry to make it interesting.

The chief characters are Stephen Brice, a native of Boston who goes to St. Louis to study law and afterwards enlists in the Union army, and Virginia Carvel, the daughter of a hot headed confederate. Of course these two young people fall in love and it is around their romance that the story is built. On account of the period of the play there is plenty of military atmosphere and, while no actual battle scene is staged, the audience can not but help feel the strain under which the people of that time were living. A hand to hand combat between a Union and Southern officer furnishes plenty of excitement in act two.

The scenic environment is beautiful and the lawn scene at a famous

country mansion is declared to be the best in this line that the Glaser forces have ever presented.

Mr. Glaser will be seen as the dashing young Northerner, Stephen Brice, and Miss Courteney as Virginia Carvel, the beautiful southern girl who captivates the Yankee, much to the discomfiture of her young cousin, por trayed by Selmer Jackson. Will D. Corbett will be seen in one of the best characterizations of his career, that of the temperamental judge, Silas Whipple. Others who have highly important roles are Harrison Stedman, Martin Woodworth, Donald Gregory, Joseph McCoy, Frank Patton, Harry Jackson, Helene Marqua, Constance Kenyon and Sue McManamev.
